Curvaceous Cook

2 tbs approx. lemon or orange juice. I love orange with beetroot, so that is what I used.
Handful of walnuts
1 tbs chopped parsley salt and pepper
2 slices soft goats cheese

handful of rocket
Serves 2 people

Easily my favourite foods of Christmas were the salted caramel sauce and cappuccino pavlova (separately!) from Nigella, and the New Year's Eve roast rib of traditional Hereford beef from Hazeldene Farm with home-grown horseradish sauce. If you are like me, the spring is a time for cutting back on the rich stuff and looking for satisfying but lighter food.

I was lucky enough to be given a bag of beetroots, straight out of the ground in the new year, and I made this recipe, the idea for which came from an Italian Vegetarian hotel Restaurant, Country House Montali. It could be a light lunch with some warm chunky bread or a very pretty starter.

Peel and slice the beetroot really thinly. If you have a mandolin that is perfect, or maybe a cheese slice or just a really sharp knife. You should be able to almost see through it. Lay these slices on 2 plates, fanning them out so they cover it. Drizzle with the juice and lots of freshly ground black pepper. Lay on the rocket, and dot blobs of the cheese all over it. Sprinkle with the walnuts. You could also splash a little really good olive oil on top.

I hated beetroot as a child, but now love it, especially raw in salads. I grow it to use the small leaves in salads, and at the end of the year I have the beets in white sauce, and will definitely be doing this again.
