#### Audrey and Ken Baxter

It is with great sadness that we announce the passing of both Ken (1933-2020) and Audrey (1936-2020) Baxter, former long-term residents of Bellingdon and established members of the Bellingdon, Asheridge and Chartridge communities.

For 35 years they lived at Blue Pines, Bellingdon, where they were well-known for the wonderful Blue Pines Light Railway. From its humble beginnings of simply a length of track and a trolley for Ken's young son Iain to enjoy, it was lovingly and extensively developed over the years by Ken and Iain, resulting in a miniature railway that ran all the way around the garden and was capable of carrying up to 25 passengers! Ken and Audrey frequently opened up the railway and gardens for charity events, including the Bellingdon Village Fete when Ken extended the railway track through the hedge and into the village hall grounds next door!



Audrey's love of the gardens at Blue Pines was the perfect complement to these charity days, as those enjoying the railway rides were treated to her beautiful floral displays which she spent many happy hours tending to. Some may also recall the ever-present Sheltie dogs, a

special love of Audrey's, and not forgetting the two donkeys who were often a source of entertainment to passers-by!

Ken was also known for his long-term service to the Bellingdon & Asheridge Village Hall committee and for Chartridge Parish Council, which he chaired from 1986-1990 and again from 1991-1992. A highly qualified engineer, he was well loved for his practical abilities and was the go-to man for anything that needed fixing!



Ken and Audrey moved away from the area in 2005. Ken passed away on 21 May this year, following several months of declining health. He died peacefully at home, with Audrey, Iain and his two daughters, Carolyn and Wendy, by his side. Then, despite overcoming some recent serious health challenges, Audrey also passed away suddenly on 8 August. A small ceremony was held for each of them at a natural burial ground near their home in the Cotswolds, with just immediate family. It is hoped that wider family and friends can be invited to a gathering next year, to remember and celebrate them both.

# Do you know...

...How many brickworks there were originally in Bellingdon and where they were located? Neither did any of us at the virtual quiz held on Friday 20<sup>th</sup> November!

Ten questions later we realised how little we knew about the villages we call home, however, courtesy of quiz master Gary Woodley, who has lived here for 55 years, we are slightly wiser and hooked!

Back to the brickworks; there were three – Bellingdon brickworks (now HG Matthews), Dunton's originally opposite HG Matthews, and Bakers brickyard, known as Lower Kiln, situated opposite Huge Farm, owned by the Baker family for three generations since 1899.

The original village store was Sandy's Stores owned and run by Peggy and Reg Bates and named after one of their daughters. It was situated opposite the "Chalet" at the south end of the village.

Intriguingly there was a tunnel that ran from Mount Nugent Farm all the way under the fields to Hawridge Church for use by priests during the reformation in the 1600's – apparently extremely narrow, small for even a child today.

Other gems we discovered:

- Les Cowell of David Naill & Co made bagpipes in his workshop in Bellingdon.
- The village football club played on land between the Bull and Hawridge Lane until the land adjoining the Hall was first rented then purchased for the village in 1965.
- The village hall is situated at just over 587ft above sea level - near to the highest point of the Chilterns which is Haddington Hill in Wendover Woods (867ft).
- The distance between the signs at either end of the village is 1.7 miles – measured by Gary driving in his car – forget Google maps!!!
- Nye Bevan MP and "father of the National Health Service" lived later life at Asheridge Farm where he died in 1960, at the age of 62.

Most poignant are the WWII plane crashes.

Many people know about the Lancaster B.Mk.1 which crashed in the fields at the bottom of Two Gates Lane. It was returning from a raid on Chemnitz, Saxony, on the night of 5/6 March 1945 coming down at 01:00 hours; sadly six of the crew were killed. Only the rear gunner survived by bailing out. The location is marked with memorial



stone along the field boundary and a memorial service was held earlier this year (see photo).

Lesser known is the Mustang Mk 1 which crashed on 22nd February 1944 at Peppetts Green. It was on route from Debden in Essex to Bovingdon. The American pilot was killed instantly.

There must be so much more to be shared... especially from residents who have lived here all their lives. ## **Curvaceous Cook**

#### **Gingerbread Stuffing**

I found this recipe a few years ago in a magazine, sorry I can't reference it, as no idea where, but it has become a firm favourite in our family, and is just a bit different on Christmas Day. I have used it for turkey, chicken and pork roasts. It keeps well, so I make it ahead, one less thing to do on the day.

In these strange Covid times I think many of us are anticipating a much smaller Christmas celebration than normal...whatever normal was...and are looking for something a bit different.

- In a processor, zap: 250g onions and 1 peeled and cored eating apple
- Gently fry in 25g butter and a glug of olive oil till soft, about 10 minutes.
- Meanwhile, zap 375 g streaky bacon and add to the pan. Cook another 5 minutes.
- Add zest of a clementine or half an orange.
- Cool a bit, then add 400g Mcvities Jamaican Ginger Cake (other makes are available!). It can now sit till you are ready to cook.
- Just before cooking, add 1 large beaten egg, and some black pepper.
- Either stuff into the rear end of the bird, or bake in a greased dish to be sliced at the table.
- Bake on 180 for 20-45 minutes
