The AGM of the Bellingdon & Asheridge Community Association (BAACA) was held, via zoom, on Tuesday 13th July.

From the Chair's report:

"The pandemic and associated restrictions have had an impact on the hall's income. During the brief periods that it was able to open, it gained some income; understandably not every club/group wanted to return immediately, especially as the rules were regularly changing and not always very clear.

Regrettably major events such as Forro Fest, Hort Soc's annual show and the Fete were cancelled, with all social activities curtailed in line with government guidelines; this also included the children's Christmas party and the senior Christmas lunch; both will be resurrected in December 2021.

Some outside activities continued - both the junior and adult football managed to have a stop/start season along with archery.

Since the restrictions have begun to ease, some of the clubs have returned to using the hall - it was good to see some of their representatives at the AGM.

The Chair thanked the booking secretary (Jo Richardson) for her fantastic work managing bookings during this difficult period, providing support and advice to the hirers.

Fortunately, the Association was eligible for government community support grants which have boosted funds, enabling planning for future maintenance and improvements to the hall and recreation grounds, including roof repairs, and car park resurfacing. These will ensure that the hall is in good working order for the community for the foreseeable future".

Ultrafast Broadband Update

We are delighted to announce that the BAACA has now signed a contract with BT Openreach for the provision of improved broadband speeds – up to 1gbps (gigabit per second) for the remainder of Bellingdon & some parts of Asheridge currently not provisioned! [Not to be confused with those covered by the Cholesbury project...Ed.]

Thanks to all those households who signed up for vouchers from DCMS (topped up by Bucks County). To get to this stage has been a major effort and the committee would like to thank Tony Orr in particular for his work with Openreach to get us to this point.

The next couple of months should see Openreach ordering equipment, finalising implementation plans etc. then the project will be moved to deployment.

How long this will take is difficult to know, although Openreach aim to have the work complete within a year, but at some stage the service will be made available for sale through the Internet retailers.

At this point householders can upgrade their service from their existing provider or use a new one. We will send a note out once this point is reached. We fully expect many more home will request the service once it is up and running. We look forward to faster speeds for our internet access in the future.

Local Business Focus

H G Matthews: the Bellingdon Brickworks

It's a fair bet that many local residents, if they hadn't done so previously, would have taken the opportunity demanded by lockdowns to explore the many paths which criss-cross the area and in so doing will have noticed, and maybe even remarked upon, the many deep dells suddenly and often unexpectedly encountered in the woods.

These are the legacy of an occupation that has been a very local activity for almost two centuries.

Our area of the Chilterns is renowned for its unusually coloured clay which lends itself to making attractive bricks of an excellent quality. Unfortunately this clay appears in very local pockets and in early years had to be dug by hand and transported the shortest distance to the nearest of the many local brickworks of which there now remains only one such still in operation – H.G.Matthews, here in Bellingdon.

The development of machinery capable of extracting clay from pockets otherwise difficult to extract from has meant that the brickworks can continue to source clay locally and with modern machinery can restore the land leaving little sign of abstraction, giving Bellingdon bricks considerably less environmental impact than those mass-produced elsewhere.

Founded by the present managing director's grandfather in 1923, firing his kilns by coal, it's doubtful that Henry Matthews would have foreseen the changes which have resulted in timber sourced locally becoming a major source of fuel.

While investing in some of the latest technology in order to remain efficient, H.G. Matthews have vehemently maintained the essence of what makes their product unique, keeping the hand-making skills alive as well as firing in traditional updraft Scotch

kilns which are fundamentally unchanged since Roman times.

In medieval times, with kiln-fired bricks commanding a high price, bricks were also made from a mixture of clay and straw, dried in the open, resulting in a brick with little structural strength.

However in his determination for both his brickworks and his products to achieve maximum sustainability, Henry's grandson Jim has revisited this ancient combination, resulting in the development of "Strocks" which are load-bearing bricks made from clay and straw but now made using methods developed at Bellingdon resulting in a product that now meets building regulations for structural use.

Similarly, Jim's team have developed Hempcrete blocks, a mixture of hemp and lime, both of which are sourced locally, providing an excellent non-structural and easy-to-lay product with a high insulation value.

Besides the brickworks, Matthews offers a fireplace supply and fitting service along with a wide range of fires and stoves all displayed in the showroom on site.
