## Litter picking

# **Ultrafast BroadBand Update**

In recent months you may have noticed the activity in the village regarding the installation of Gigabit Broadband. There have been many Openreach engineer visits and fibre has now been 'pulled' from the main cabinets through ducts and to the main poles carrying the existing telephony/internet services across Bellingdon.

Against this background you may, like us, have been rather surprised to have recently received an email from DCMS suggesting that your Gigabit Internet Voucher will be expiring soon. We were all looking forward to the 'release' of the new fibre network to service providers (e.g. BT, Sky, Talk Talk) in May enabling us all to order the new high speed service.

Tony Orr has been in correspondence with Openreach who have advised that the sending of this email is an administrative process that they cannot control, but that we should not be concerned at this stage and there is no action that residents need to take. We have been promised an update 'at the earliest opportunity on any remedial steps required if any'. We will be in touch again when we have more information.

We recently carried out hedge trimming to ensure that our roads remain passable and visibility for all road users is maintained. A kind reminder that for the majority of the Parish it is the landowner's responsibility to keep hedges and verges cut and if these aren't maintained you may receive a letter reminding you of this.

Some of you may have seen the notices that the Public Byway No.38, located off Ramscote Lane, will be

closed 4th February - 4th July whilst surface repair repair works take place. Given this is 6 months we've been in-touch with Buckinghamshire County Council and have the following update from them: "The length of the advertised closure gives us sufficient time to follow legal process, acquire materials, make repairs and adjust for periods of bad weather. In reality the route will only physically be closed for a few days and where possible we will continue to allow walkers and riders to access the route when safe to do so when contractors are on site."

The Parish Council is also planning to mark the Diamond Jubilee, the current leading idea is to plant trees in the Parish and we would welcome suggestion on locations or other initiatives and ideas the Parish Council may be able to support.

# The Bull

Despite the lengthy delay since the new Nursery building was constructed and inhabited, things have been progressing with the plans for the pub itself.

Whilst delays were inevitably occasioned by the pandemic and especially its effect on the hospitality industry, efforts have continued behind the scenes to establish a solid basis for the future success of the business.

With no real knowledge of the pub and restaurant trade, the owners require the partnership of an experienced operator and with the advice of their leisure industry consultants it became clear that any such operator would want their own input to both the

build and fitting-out to ensure the finished building meets their requirements.

Further discussions have led to the realisation that to meet such requirements there will need to be some changes to the original plans approved by the local authority and it is hoped that an agreement will be signed with a suitable operator and that any such amendments will be submitted early this year.

### **Curvaceous Cook**

### **Paska**

As a token of solidarity with Ukraine, I thought I would offer the Easter bread of that country. I have a Ukranian niece-in-law, and she tells me this is an authentic recipe, and commonly made at home for easter. You can fancy it up with plaited dough on the top or round the top if you wish, or just use the whole mix to make a loaf. It is usually round and high, and you break bits off it or slice it. It is a slightly sweetened enriched dough, and you can add dried fruit, but that is not as they would normally eat it.

You can use any cup if you don't have the proper measured ones.

### For the dough:

- 5 cups (602 g) plain or strong flour (traditionally white)
- 1 pack instant dried yeast (1 ¼ tsp)
- ¼ cup (50g) granulated sugar
- 2 ½ tsp salt
- 1 cup tepid water
- ½ cup whole milk
- · 2 large eggs
- $\frac{1}{4}$  cup(4tbs) unsalted butter at room temperature For the topping:
- 1 large egg
- 1 tbs water
- 1 tbs granulated sugar

Mix all dough ingredients together to a soft smooth ball. It should not be sticky when properly ready. I use a stand mixer with a dough hook.

Set aside to rise for about an hour, it should be nearly doubled in size. Grease a 9" springform or cake tin. Pull off about a quarter of the dough if you are going to do the plaits, otherwise, shape all the dough into a ball, and put in centre of the pan.

Make plait of the small bit if you want to, and either place in a cross or around the edge of the tin.



Cover and leave to rise for another 45 minutes, till nearly doubled again.

Heat oven to 180C, with the rack quite low

Beat egg and water together and brush over the top, sprinkle on the sugar.Bake for 35 to 45 minutes until rich golden brown. Let it cool completely before slicing

If there is any left over, it makes excellent toast or french toast
