Community Speedwatch

Facts about speeding

- 97% of speeding offences are detected by fixed cameras
- Fatalities caused by speeding are 4 times likelier to happen in rural areas than in urban ones.
- More deaths occur from driving accidents than all other crimes.

As relevant as these figures for collision casualties is the concern to rural communities of feeling safe when using roads recreationally.

For those of you who ride bicycles, horses or ponies, walk or jog through our villages, or maybe are just concerned about the dangers from speeding vehicles to those who enjoy these pursuits, a measure of local relief will shortly be at hand.

Any group of residents can start a Community Speedwatch (CSW) and our Parish Council has been granted permission to set one up in our two villages to monitor traffic and, hopefully, to reduce the incidence of drivers exceeding the safe limits.

So how does CSW work?

Once it has been sanctioned between the Police and the local authority, a request goes out to the community for volunteers.

These volunteers must undergo a basic induction programme, done presently online, and pass a simple test (almost impossible to fail since multiple attempts at each question are permitted) to prove understanding of the principles.

The local CSW must provide the speed recorder, hi-viz jackets, signage and the necessary tools for logging the speeds. Our local authority has made funding available for this.

The CSW organiser works with the local community police to agree where and when the monitoring will take place with due recognition given to health and safety of all involved.

Monitors work in pairs and record all vehicles exceeding the limit. Registered keepers of vehicles exceeding the speed limit are contacted, initially by letter, explaining the potential risks and consequences of their dangerous behaviour. Repeat offenders will receive a visit from the local police. Beyond this, focused enforcement and criminal prosecution follow based on the collated evidence.

CSW is not about interfering with neighbour's behaviour, it is a pro-active solution to improve the safety and quality of life for everyone in our local community.

Gigabit Broadband Fibre Project - Progress

In the last week (13 May) we have received a progress update regarding the Gigabit Broadband project. The date is significant as it was the original target date for BT Openreach to release the network to retailers (Sky, Talktalk, Virgin, BT etc) for it to be sold to villagers in the northern half of Bellingdon.

The good news is that the build itself has gone according to plan and the customer network (i.e. the fibre laid in the village) is complete and ready to be tested and released for service. However, when Openreach visited the fibre 'exchange' to complete the connection to the 'core' network they found issues (most likely to be a shortage of capacity).

This has meant a delay in completing the fibre network and Openreach being unable to link the customer network to the 'core' fibre network. Further works are now scheduled to finish by the end of July 2022, when it should be possible to place an order. Openreach have apologised for the delays, stating that they were unforeseen and impossible to predict. We will be in contact when we have any update.

Curvaceous Cook

Strawberry Tart

Hopefully when you read this you will have lovely strawberries growing in the garden, or be able to buy really good local ones. I don't think it is worth making this with the tasteless, out of season fruits that masquerade as strawberries.

An electric whisk is an advantage, and please don't be put off by the creme patissiere, it is really easy, just take your time. This glorious party pud will feed 12, and is adapted from BBC Good Food.

- 125g slightly softened unsalted butter
- 80g icing sugar
- 1 egg
- 200g plain flour
- 100g strawberry jam (worth getting a good one, or even better, home made)
- 500g strawberries. If big, slice all but one in half, if small, or alpine, leave whole
- · 2 tbs apricot jam
- 300ml milk
- 150 ml double cream
- 1 tsp vanilla extract (not essence)
- 3 egg yolks
- 50g caster sugar
- 3 ½ tbs cornflour
- 50g butter, softened and cubed

To make the pastry, either put all but egg in processor and pulse until like breadcrumbs, then pulse in the egg, or: beat butter and sugar together till smooth, mix in egg, then stir in the flour.

Bring together with your hands to form a ball and chill for 30 minutes.

Heat oven to 200/180 fan/gas 6. Roll out pastry to 3cm bigger than your tin (approx 23cm, ideally fluted), and line the tin, letting it hang over the edge a little. Line with baking parchment and beans, and bake for 15 minutes.

Remove paper and beans and bake for another 15-20 minutes until crisp and golden. Tidy the top with a sharp knife if necessary. Leave in the tin to cool.



For the creme patissiere, heat the milk, cream and vanilla extract (or a scraped vanilla pod) to a simmer over a medium heat, stirring gently now and then.

Whisk the egg yolks and sugar for about 3 minutes till pale, then stir in the cornflour. Pour over a quarter of the hot cream mix, whisking continuously, then tip into the pan. Stir over a medium heat for 5-8 minutes until it thickens. Transfer to large bowl and leave to cool for 15 minutes, whisking occasionally.

Gradually whisk in the cubed butter and cover. Put in fridge until needed. Put the tart case on your serving tray or plate. Spread the jam over the bottom of the case, then either spread or pipe the creme patissiere all over the top.

Arrange the strawberries, starting at the edge, with your whole one in the middle. Heat the apricot jam with a splash of lemon juice and 1 tbs water until warm. Whisk slightly and cool for a couple of minutes, then brush over the top of the strawberries to give a glow.
