Curvaceous Cook

Apple Strudel

I am starting to make room for this year's bounty in my pantry, and have 2 year old jars of bottled apples that I prepare in Italy and bring back with me as the best way to preserve and transport them. I use them as they are, or use them to make chutney and jam throughout the winter, but 2 years ago we had so many that I ran out of ideas and need to get them used! I am not a lover of sweet things, and usually forget to make a pud, but it is Easter lunch as I write this, so this seemed a good celebration, whilst being really easy to make, and also used up some left over from Christmas filo pastry, and stale bread! It is a simple party pud too, this should feed 8-10 people.

- 225 g filo pastry
- 700g cooking apples, peeled, cored and sliced, or from a jar of bottled apples with the juice drained off
- 50 g currants
- 50 g sultanas
- 3 level tbs caster sugar (I don't use any as I bottle them in slightly sugared water)
- 2 tsp mixed spice, we like it spicy, use less if you don't
- 40 g melted butter
- 125 g fresh breadcrumbs
- 25 g flaked almonds and icing sugar and cinnamon to decorate

Mix together the apples, dried fruit, spices and sugar if using and leave to steep for a bit.

Lay out a layer of filo on a clean t-towel and brush with melted butter. Repeat with a second layer on top of the first.

Sprinkle the breadcrumbs all over, leaving a margin at the edges of a couple of inches. These will absorb some of the apple juice and stop it getting soggy.

Lay the fruit mix over the top, again leaving a margin at the edges.

Fold the sides of the filo over the fruit, then roll up, using the t-towel so you have a long sausage, with the edges enclosed. Place on baking tray, traditionally in a horse shoe shape.

Brush with melted butter and bake on 190/ mk 5 for about 40 minutes until golden brown and crispy.

Sprinkle over the almonds for the last 5 minutes if using

Dredge with a mix of icing sugar and cinnamon (if you like it, but fine without) and serve warm or cold with custard or cream

Exciting new nature project at the Village Hall

Did you know that the term "lawn" referring to a managed grass space, dates back to the 16th century. With suburban expansion, the lawn became culturally ingrained as a desired household aesthetic. However, awareness of the negative environmental impact of this ideal is growing.

Did you also know that we are experiencing catastrophic insect and wildlife decline? British garden birds have declined by 48% in just 5 years and flying insects by 60% and this is linked to loss of habitats and food sources and climate change.

How can we all help? Insects have adapted to feed and live on native plants and wildflowers are perfectly adapted to be the best sources of food and shelter. Some valuable wildflowers have unfortunately become known by the term 'weed' which simply means 'a plant that is not valued where it is growing'. By simply relaxing our maintenance regimes and allowing natural flowers to bloom, we will help insects and birds and mammals.

In addition, every time we cut the lawn, we not only destroy a little bit of nature, but we put more carbon dioxide into the air from the mower and we reduce the carbon capture ability of longer grass. We also create a lot of unnecessary noise pollution – have you ever sat outside on a lovely sunny day just to be plagued by the sound of mowers and strimmers and, worst of all, leaf blowers?

With all this in mind, BAACA, the fantastic charity looking after the management of the Bellingdon & Asheridge village hall site, has agreed to a project to help nature. The project will be run by myself and will receive expert advice from Chesham Environmental Group member, Trevor Brawn. I have secured a grant for the project (thanks to Piers from the Chiltern Society who has been our contact through the River Chess Smarter Water Catchment initiative) and we will start to allow nature to regenerate round the edges of the playing fields. This will not affect the football pitches which will be mown as usual.

We will monitor the natural species that arrive and then add local plants in sections. This increased biodiversity

will bring colour, scent and attract many more insects and butterflies, birds and mammals.

In addition, the grant will allow us to add some extra blossom trees – valuable for early pollinator food, and for the public, picnic tables and benches. There will be projects for local children and scouts and guides, such as building bug hotels and bee banks and bee scrapes.

Thanks to Alf Field, BACCA chairman, the mowing regime has already changed and 2 water butts have been fitted – this rainwater will be used for any new trees and additional planting.

The project will run for up to 2 years and we will see how the site develops and record and monitor the additional fauna and flora. In the meantime – everyone can help fight the terrible decline of nature by simply relaxing more and allowing nature to thrive.
