BRAZIERS END POND

In January we saw the first community day organised by the Chiltern Society with funding from the 'Chess Smarter Water Catchment'. With plenty of



volunteers and a lot of enthusiasm a good start was made on clearing the banks and invasive plants. In addition there was some dredging of the pond which produced some interesting finds including the ubiquitous traffic cone and road sign PLUS a safe! Unfortunately, the safe was empty.

Tree works commenced on 12th Feb to remove trees with ash dieback and pollarding to some of the mature trees to maintain their health. The work will allow more light to the pond and remove invasive nonnative species. Next steps include investigation into water quality and examining the types of species that already call the pond and surrounding land home. Thanks go

to Buckinghamshire Council (Landowners), Chartridge Parish Council and the Chiltern Society for their support on the community day, as well as the kind volunteers. Further community days will be planned later in the year. For further information please go to www.chesssmarterwatercatchment.org

REWILDING PROJECT

Information signs were added where the planting will take place to explain the project. The gully by the hall was filled with compost and a mix of herbs and wildflowers added - these will provide early nectar and shelter - frogs have already been found hiding where we planted. Two new water butts were added - thanks to BAACA chairman Alf and these will be essential during the summer droughts. The grant also paid for a new recycled plastic bench

Spring flowering native cowslips & over 2000 crocus bulbs were planted by local scouts groups in November in the grass section by the road hedge. Four native trees were sourced from a local plant nursery in Chartridge and planted to provide berries in winter, blossom in spring and shade - a rowan, hawthorn and 2 flowering cherry blossoms. A big thank you to Paul Muggeridge-Breene & family for helping me to plant them.

Herbs and drought resistant pollinator friendly plants have been been added to the grass verge by the playground with assorted spring bulbs including camasses and hyacinth which were donated. Paul, Trevor and I built a scrape, a bee bank for nesting bees and a bug hotel.



More wildflowers have been purchased as plug plants and I am growing them on to strengthen them. These will be added to the grass areas on the edge of the playing fields to improve biodiversity:

White Clover, Red Clover, Forget-menot, Geranium, Mallow, Red Campion, Betony, Bugle, Sweet Woodruff, Pulmonaria, Wood Sage, Sage, Thyme, Mint, Ice Plant, Marjoram, Lavender, Verbena, Hedge Bedstraw, Ladies Bedstraw.

If you have wildflowers plants you can donate or any of the following:

Knapweed, Self-Heal, Chickweed, Hebe, Purple Loosestrife, Yarrow, Birdsfoot Trefoil, Vipers Bugloss, Scabious, Evening Primrose, Hemp Agrimony, Dead Nettles, Rosemary, Perennial Cornflowers, Honeysuckle, Black Mullein, Ragged Robin, Teasels, Corncockle, Scabious, Echiums, Ox-eye Daisies, Hedge Woundwort, Foxgloves, Nettle-leaved Bellflower, Wood Sage, Honesty & hollyhocks.

DEREK KEEN 10th May 1945 – 28th December 2023

Derek was a Chilterns man; he was born at Inglenook (now Hunter's Oak), Asheridge, married at Cholesbury Church (1971), then lived and worked in Asheridge. He met his wife, Doris Fromming, at the Blue Ball and once married lived in the farmhouse at Asheridge. Derek started work as a farm labourer at Widmore Farm, Asheridge and by the age of 26 he was Farm Manager. When the farm was

sold they moved to Bellingdon with their son Peter (born 1974) and daughter Debbie (born 1976). From here Derek started his own business as a gardener.

Derek was a very active member of the community serving as a Parish Councillor and a time as Chairman. He was also Chairman of our own Bellingdon & Asheridge Village Hall. He loved playing cricket on a Sunday and contributed to the running of the Club.

He was a good friend of Cholesbury church where his parents and sister are buried by the large Rhododendron. Every year the grave was planted with annual bedding and



kept well tended. Even when illness prevented Derek from doing this, he sent a gardener to turf the area. This was typical of his thoughtfulness and an example of his kindness which many have reported. His gardening work was appreciated by a great many grateful clients in the villages, being so reliable with a good plant knowledge. Derek was also an allotment holder at Buckland Common and with Doris they worked three allotments. They

were very generous in sharing with their many friends the invariable surplus.

Derek suffered ill health in later years which together with rheumatoid arthritis curtailed his activity. He caught Covid which his weakened body could not resist. His parents' headstone is inscribed "At peace in God's garden" – surely true for Derek.

His son, Peter, lives in Woodley, Berkshire where he has an aquatics business and his daughter, Debbie lives in Bellingdon where she is well known in the equestrian community.

LABNEH & CHEESE BISCUITS

I first discovered <u>labneh</u> when my husband was working in Kuwait. I then forgot it until I was left with a spare pot of Greek yoghurt that was just out of date after Christmas. It is so simple and tastes so fresh with just a few additions. As long as there isn't actually mould growing on the yoghurt you can use it, but it should be full fat Greek yogurt Mix a little sea salt, stir, then tip onto a piece of muslin or a jelly bag, and tie it over a wooden spoon to hang over a bowl that it can drip into. You will be amazed how much liquid comes off after a few hours, or ideally overnight. Next day, give it a stir and add in whatever flavours you want to, or just leave it plain for a more interesting cream cheese. I like to add finely grated lemon rind and a mix of herbs, parsley, thyme and rosemary is a good one. It can then be stored in a pot, covered with extra virgin olive oil, for a week or so. You can also roll it into balls, then roll it

in a herb mix, put them in a jar, cover with oil and eat as required. The best way is in a salad, on little gem lettuce leaves, on scoop shaped crisps or tortilla chips, or onto one of these really quick & easy

Cheese Biscuits

4 oz plain flour
4 oz softened butter
% tsp cayenne pepper
1 tsp dry mustard powder
4 oz mature cheese, or mix of
cheeses

Whizz all in processor, mixer or by hand till it forms a clump. Into fridge for 30 minutes. Then roll out into whatever shapes you like. I usually make them bite size.

Cook for 5-8 minutes in a hottish oven. Cool on a rack so they firm up before eating, if you can wait that long as they are very Moorish!
