BELLINGDON AND ASHERIDGE VILLAGE HALL (BAACA)

At the AGM in July the Treasurer reported the positive news that the Association which is responsible for running the hall is in a strong financial position.

The Chairman confirmed the importance of annual events which are key to provide for the maintenance of the hall and recreation ground for Community use. In addition, Rumble and Forro Fest along with a new cycling event raise funds that enable us to maintain, improve and update the facilities and grounds. In the coming year the focus is on the exterior, checking the roof, repairing the entrance to the car park and extending the tarmac to the whole area to achieve maximum capacity.

An area around the playing field and in front of the hall has been set aside for rewilding to improve wildlife diversity, while new benches have been installed in the playground with another sited on the playing field. Plans are in hand to add some additional equipment for the older children to broaden its appeal.

Events will continue into the Winter including an afternoon tea in

October and the very popular Childrens and Seniors Christmas
parties in December.

The Chairman closed by thanking the previous Editor of the newsletter Helen Valvona for her commitment in editing and producing it – the baton has now been handed onto Jo Askew; the Bookings Secretary Jo Richardson in ensuring bookings remain healthy and that hall is hired to a wide range of groups and finally the committee, Don Baker as Honorary Treasurer, Kirsty Fiddes, Hugh Griffiths, Helen Harding and Gary Woodley while welcoming Paul Muggeridge-Breene as new member.

The hall and facilities continue to remain one of best locally, achieved by the teamwork and support of a small and dedicated group.

DID YOU KNOW - ON YOUR DOORSTEP

Many would have seen the Hawker Hunter parked at the Halton Village road junction when travelling about and are aware not only of the RAF base, but also of its many facilities.

only of the RAF base, but also of its many facilitie.

However did you know:

- It is one of the largest RAF stations housing over 2,100 personnel with 2,300 graduating each year from Basic Training. The base houses:
- An rehab unit serving 20,000 personnel.
- The Counter Intelligence Capability -Threat Team
- The Joint Information Activities Group—a small team providing comms and intelligence which can be deployed within 12 hours to anywhere in the world.

What is **not** widely known is that there is an interesting **museum** on the RAF base, opened in June 1999 by the then Viscount

Trenchard. It was his grandfather, known as 'The Father of the Royal Air Force' who founded the apprentice scheme which was

based at Halton. This included all trades in support of the RAF and still today all basic training for the RAF is carried out at Halton. The museum includes displays of the various trades as well as a Folland Gnat ex Red Arrows, guns, engines PLUS a supervised flight simulator.

The museum is run entirely by volunteers . It is free to enter but visits must be booked in advance at

CURVACEOUS COOK - STUFFED AUBERGINES

I buy a lot of aubergines now, but was put off for many years because of having to salt them and fry them in copious oil. These days I griddle with a light spray of oil rather than frying. I was given some fresh ricotta by a neighbour and came up with this dish that worked really well. It could be prepared well ahead and is also delicious cold the next day.

To cook the aubergines I simply sprayed the slices lightly with olive oil, sprinkled salt and pepper and popped on the BBQ. It took about 5 minutes to get them nicely soft and a bit brown, but could just as easily have been pan fried or used a griddle pan

All ingredients are a guide only, add or subtract to suit your taste. Bring sauce to boil, then simmer gently to thicken slightly whilst you make your rolls. Take each piece of aubergine, starting at the thinner end, place a good helping of filling and simply roll up. Place in a dish which will hold them all quite tightly, having covered the bottom with a little sauce. They can sit like this for ages, when ready to cook, warm through the sauce, pour over the rolls and grill under medium heat till bubbling, or put in the oven. You could sprinkle some more cheese on top. I serve with French beans or a salad, but just a crunchy loaf would be delicious.

For a generous 2 servings

1 large straight aubergine, sliced lengthwise about 1 cm thick—cover with cling film when cooked as this makes them softer and easier to roll

Olive oil and salt and pepper

The Filling

1 cup ricotta, if using from a pot, let it drain a bit

¾ cup grated parmesan, or any other strong cheese

½ cup breadcrumbs (not dried in a packet, just whizz up some crusts)

½ cup basil leaves, chopped

Good tsp. of lemon zest

1 1/2 tbs lemon juice

Mix all together well and season to taste

The Sauce

Olive oil, warmed with

3 cloves garlic (or to taste) grated or minced

Add 1 tsp chopped fresh oregano, or ½ tsp dry oregano

1 tsp pul biber (red pepper flakes)

Jar passata (or whizz up a couple of tins of tomatoes)

Pinch of sugar

Potholes continue to concern us. Where possible we would request that residents report potholes to Buckinghamshire Council via FixMyStreet.

We continue to monitor speeding using CPC's own Mvas cameras, a second camera having been installed permanently in Bellingdon. The data from this latest camera motorists speeding through the villages. has highlighted the speeding issues particularly in Bellingdon. The promised camera for Chartridge Lane, funded by the Chesham and Villages Community Board,

has still not been installed by Buckinghamshire Council, so Asheridge and Chartridge continue to share a camera. Cllr Lherbier has been instrumental in the community speedwatch programme and regularly gives her time, with other volunteers, to monitoring and registering CPC continues a Devolved Services agreement with Bucks CC which means that its residents in the queries and problems the cutting of the hedges and verges in 30 and 40 mph areas continues to be organised <u>joan.lherbier@chartridgeparishcouncil.org</u>


