improve the car park—goodbye potholes! Additionally, the playground team, with the help of a resident, is applying for funding to **update and add new equipment**.

Community engagement and continuous improvement are key to keeping the hall a valued space. If you have ideas, time, or skills to contribute, we'd love to hear from you. Let's work together to ensure the hall remains a vibrant hub for all!

The running and future of the hall is entrusted to the Community Association (BAACA) who are very much aware its **'Your Hall, Your Community'** - **sharing your thoughts enables us to shape the future of our village hall together.**

DID YOU KNOW – BLUE PLAQUE IN BELLINGDON



It is on Bellingdon Farm Cottage No.1 & is where D.H. Lawrence lived from August 1914 to January 1915 with his wife Frieda. During his time here he wrote Rainbow and a Study on Thomas Hardy. They then moved down to Sussex, overcome by the cold and damp of the cottage. Certainly Lawrence always

suffered with frail health.

His wife Frieda, was the daughter of Baron von Richthoven (an engineer in the Imperial German Army) and a distant cousin of

the "Red Baron". They were harassed by police and ostracized by the local citizens in Cornwall because of her nationality and his burgeoning reputation as a banned writer. At one point they were even suspected of signalling to German submarines using the items on the washing line! They left Cornwall in 1917 to spend the rest of the war in London and Derbyshire.

CURVACEOUS COOK – STICKY JAMAICAN GINGER CAKE

Happy New Year to you all. Every year I make a gingerbread stuffing for the turkey, and this year was unable to find that stalwart Jamaican ginger cake in the green packet anywhere, so I searched the internet and found this one on the Hodmedod site. If you don't know of them, they grow lentils, chickpeas and lots of other pulses and some amazing grain for flour, all in East Anglia! Well worth a look. This based on the recipe by Amy Oboussier. I had all the ingredients as I make my own bread, but they are readily available in supermarkets. The quantity I am using made a 9" x 6" x 2" cake. I didn't bother with the glaze and it stayed sticky and delicious for 10 days.

INGREDIENTS

- 115 g brown sugar (I used dark brown)
- 115 g butter
- 100 g molasses (you could use treacle, but this is less sweet and gives a rounder flavour)
- 1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

- 1.5 teaspoon ground ginger (you could use less)
- 85 g rye flour (I used light rye bread flour from M&S)
- 85 g malted wheat flour
- Pinch of salt
- 105 ml milk
- 1 egg

METHOD

Line your tin with greaseproof paper and set oven to 160 degrees fan. Melt sugar, molasses and butter in largish pan, whisking till no grains of sugar are felt. Cool slightly. Weigh remainder and add into the cooled wet mix. I added chopped preserved ginger at this point as I love it...up to you. Bake for 45-50 minutes until just coming away from the sides, and a toothpick in the middle comes out clean. If you are going to use the glaze, melt together 40ml water, 40ml white sugar and 2 slices fresh ginger. Bring to the boil then glaze onto hot cake. This would make a great winter pudding with custard or cream.

ST. JOHN'S CHURCH

Spring is finally on its way, and if you look at the small flower bed to the right of the entrance to the church you will see snowdrops and small daffodils. The snowdrops remind us of Grace Martin, and the daffodils of Molly Edmunds, both of whom were faithful members of St. John's.



You may have known one or both of them.

In the church we have just finished our sermon series on parts Corinthians, and we are now embarking on the gospel of Luke followed by Isaiah in April. Our services are at 10 am every Sunday morning. The first Sunday of each month is a service of Holy Communion.

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REWILDING PROJECT

All the trees we added are doing very well . Look out for the tulips and spring bulbs. The rewilded edge is growing nicely and is evidently being used by wildlife. The drought tolerant planting next to the hall is well established and more shrubs will continue to be added to the verge by the playground - all in all a success.




THE VILLAGE BOOK MARK

Kingmaker by Sir Graham Brady

Non-Fiction 293 Pages:2024

You do not have to belong to any political tribe to enjoy reading this. The whole country went through the revolving door of Prime Ministers at No 10, I met most of them as a campaigner (except Truss). The role of chairman of the 1922 committee before the carnage was largely unheard of, let alone thrust into the public eye -as Brady clearly was. Let's face it, if we look back on the political farce he had much to deal with, at first hand he witnessed what the Tories do best, which is backstabbing each other. Nevertheless, Brady depicts himself as a calm person amidst the turmoil of a political party effectively hung by their own petard. If you add to that a Coalition, Brexit, Partygate and a culture of delusional invincibility there is a lot to cover. But he manages to do this well in a readable account without too much character assassination, but in between the lines he does pull some punches and clearly demonises Boris, but he does it - as you would expect from a Kingmaker - in a very diplomatic way. But we all know!



Neverwhere by Neil Gaiman

Fiction 448 Pages:1996

As a rule I do not read fantasy, so when this was selected by one of our book club members I made my resting unhappy face. The reason for starting the Our Chesham Book Club was to be taken out of my comfort zone, so this was way out in the ether for me. But I really enjoyed it. As I was about to embark on a lot of driving I listened on Audible, there is no doubt for me it made the story come more to life. The fact that it was set in the familiar territory of London made it perhaps easier, albeit under the streets of London. But with so many familiar landmarks you do not need to be a black cab driver to read this. I loved the idea that there are Angels at the Angel Islington, an Earl at Earls Court and a load of Shepherds at Shepherds Bush. So I recommend submerging yourself



in this fantasy, succumb to the story and the wonderful characters Gaiman introduces us too, all done without the use of recreational chemistry!
