ground. There will also be a donation to the Chiltern Food Bank charity.

NEW TRUSTEES

NEW CAR PARK

The village hall will soon have a fantastic new car park, thanks to the money raised at community events like the village fete plus a generous donation from the National Lottery Community Fund.

The work will see the whole car park area resurfaced, along with the entrance area next to the road. The current surfaces are old and damaged, and the lower half of the car park has no surface at all, so the improvements will be dramatic!

White lines will also be painted to mark out individual spaces, which will help increase capacity and alleviate the shortages experienced during busy times.

The new car park should be complete by the middle of October.

PLAYGROUND UPDATE

In July, Alf (Chairman) and Debs (our new Trustee) attended the Parish Council meeting to present our plans for the playground and ask for their support. The project was warmly received, and councillors – including Bucks county councillors – offered some really helpful advice and insight.

We are now busy preparing our planning application (yes, we need one!). We're very grateful to local resident David, who is kindly giving his time and professional expertise pro bono – he also drew up the plans for the 2011 playground project. Submitting the application does involve some significant costs, so we're looking at ways to keep those as low as possible.

Fundraising remains our biggest focus. Debs has been working hard on grant applications, but competition is tough, with fewer funds available nationally and locally. That said, our **GoFundMe** page is still open, and we would love more local residents to get involved. Remember, if you donate and tick Gift Aid, every £1 you

give is worth £1.25 to us and you may even benefit from tax relief yourself.

Thanks to the amazing support of the Bellingdon and Asheridge Community Association, who have pledged £25,000 in matched funding, we're already halfway there but we still need to raise the other half to reach our £50,000 target. Every contribution, big or small, makes a real difference to getting this exciting project over the line!

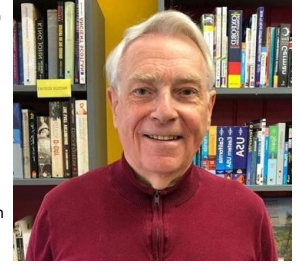

HISTORY & CULTURE CLUB

This month we are fortunate to have Ben Batten, the well known Chesham poet, coming to talk to us. For many years Ben was head of English at Dr Challoner's and is one of the judges of the annual Chesham Poetry Competition. He runs a poetry group in Chesham and has made a series of 8 podcasts for Chesham Literary Festival on how to write a poem. He has donated the proceeds from the sale of his books to a number of charities. A review from his published book of poetry stated "This is a beautiful set of poems from

a versatile and accomplished poet who often focuses on the small, precious moments in life and captures them with humour and delicacy".

Ben is going to read and talk about some of his poetry. The meeting will take place at 11:30am on Saturday 13th September at St John's Church.



CURVACEOUS COOK - AVGOLEMONO

I have made this delicious Greek soup many times using a complicated recipe, but came across this version by Sarah Raven which is much simpler and just as tasty. It's good on those autumnal days when you want something warming but are not ready for a full on stew. It is a soup, but actually makes a lovely light lunch. Unusually for me, this does not freeze, and can't really be made ahead, but it doesn't take long to prepare.

For 4 people

2 good chicken breasts, ideally free range or organic

1 litre good chicken stock. This can be home made or bought, but stock cubes don't really cut it here

50 g long grain white rice

2 egg yolks

4 tbs lemon juice

1 tbs fresh tarragon or chives. Personally I prefer chives here

Plenty of flat leaved parsley, roughly chopped

- Cut the chicken into bite sized pieces and simmer gently for 5 minutes in just enough stock to cover it.
- Add the washed rice and the rest of the stock, and cook until the rice is soft. There should still be enough stock to make it soupy. Set aside until lukewarm
- In a large bowl whisk the egg yolks and add the lemon juice. Carefully whisk in some of the tepid soup.
- Continue adding and stirring to equalise the temperature of the two liquids, then pour all back into the pan.
- Very gently heat again until it thickens slightly. If you boil it you will make the eggs clump.
- Take it off the heat, add the herbs and taste. You may wish to adjust the seasoning and add more lemon juice.
- Ladle into bowls and garnish with the parsley and more chives.

Eat pronto and enjoy!

CHARTRIDGE PARISH COUNCIL

HAWRIDGE LANE

The Chartridge Parish Council met with the Cholesbury Parish Council on 13 August, together with Mayor and Local Councillor Fulford, to review the condition of Hawridge Lane. The lane has required maintenance for several years and remains a valued route for walkers, horse riders, and local residents accessing the Velo Café and surrounding areas.

Our aim is to see Hawridge Lane repaired, as it is currently only passable with considerable effort and at some risk to users. We may, in due course, seek wider support through a petition to strengthen our case for its restoration.

In the meantime, we await Councillor Fulford's progress in raising this matter at the local authority level. Should you wish to express your support, please feel free to contact me at

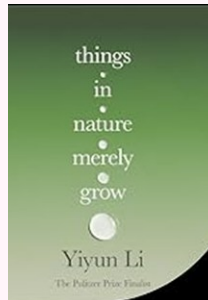

THE VILLAGE BOOK MARK

Things in Nature Merely Grow by Yiyun Li.

Non-Fiction 172 pages

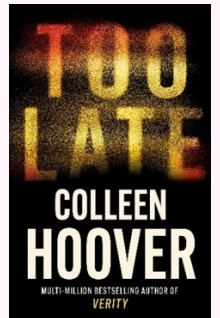
This wonderful book of reflections is by a mother who lost both of her teenage sons to suicide. Li is not seeking any readers sympathy or even tears, it is an example of courage and resilience in the face of despair. It is full of wonderful language as you would expect from a writer with so many accolades in literature and writing. The opening line is "There is no good way to say this", said by the police officer charged with informing her. It is not difficult to be entranced by her love and loss; she writes so eloquently. Read this book slowly and with thought, I can never walk in her shoes, but I felt the footsteps: "Vincent was and is and will always be Vincent. James was and is and will always be James. We were and are and will always be their parents. There is no now and then, now and later; only now and now and now and now." This and many other lines will live with me long into the future.



Too Late by Colleen Hoover

Fiction. 381 Pages

A fan of said author recently posted a picture on social media, it showed young adults sunbathing around a beach resort, everyone in the image was reading a Colleen Hoover book – or CoHo as her fans call her. She has sold over 30 million books worldwide, so no flash in the pan. Up until this year I had only read 'It Ends With Us', then a friend told me to read this novel by CoHo (when in Rome!). This is not her normal romantic hallmark chick lit, this is a dark thriller and she does a good job with it – even though as she reveals it was only supposed to be a side project. It still has that element of romance, Sloan and Carter being the protagonists in this story, but it twists the way a good psychological thriller should. Sloan has an obsessive boyfriend/pimp who would scare the bejesus out of most of us. All in all a good page turner from one of those marmite authors. I hate marmite, but I did like this story.
